Board Appreciation and Recognition

Illinois Association of School Boards has designated Wednesday November 15, 2017 as Board Appreciation and Recognition Day. Dr. Fessler presented the Board of Education with a Certificate of Appreciation and thanked them for their service and commitment to District 59.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

5.01 Transportation Q&A

Representatives from Grand Prairie Transit, and First Student along with Mary Gonzalez, Coordinator of Transportation, responded to questions raised by Board of Education members regarding the safety of students. Details on the training process and safety measures were discussed.

5.02 Award of Bid for Paper

District 59 issues a paper bid once each year for a quantity projected to meet one year's needs. The quantity stipulated in the bid is a best estimate to enable the vendor to determine a fair price. However, the District is not required to purchase a specific quantity and may order more or less as needed.

This year the bid is for xerographic and vellum paper. Any variety of instructional paper including construction paper is ordered by each building as needed. The bid is awarded by category and the vendor holds the inventory until the District requests partial deliveries.

The bid specifications require the vendor to quote unit prices inclusive of shipping costs and stipulated delivery throughout the school year. The specifications also allow the District to compare prices with the state contract. Items purchased through the state contract are exempt from bidding requirements (105 ILCS 5/10-20.21) and only xerographic paper is available.

This year, the state contract prices for xerographic paper do not provide any savings, as they are less competitive than local vendor bid results. Murnane Paper submitted the low bid for xerographic paper and Veritiv Operating Company submitted the low bid for vellum.

The Board will take action on November 27, 2017.

5.03 Consolidation Considerations District 57

Dr. Fessler and Board President Somogyi shared that Consolidated School District 57 is reaching out to surrounding districts asking to consider a consolidation. Dr. Fessler explained that there is a lengthy process to consolidating two districts. Members of the Board shared their thoughts on advantages and disadvantages for considering this consolidation.

5.04 D214 Articulation Review and Success Indicators

Elk Grove High School Principal, Mr. Paul Kelly, and Grove Junior High Principal, Mr. John Harrington, discussed the joint effort both schools are making to help students transition from junior high into high school. Mentors from the high school meet with junior high students throughout the year. Mr. Kelly feels very strongly that District 59 is preparing students for high school.

Of the 2,063 elementary schools in IL, District 59 ranks in the bottom half as their performance scores are below the state's average. During our observation of the dual language program at Byrd School, we were informed that several school districts visited D59's schools to observe their program. Perhaps it is time for our administrators to observe some better performing schools. We realize the challenges schools have to educate a large population of low-income and English-language learners, but it is possible and some schools have done a better job. Using the scatterplots from IL Report Card on Juliette Low, I found several much better performing schools with very similar demographics to J Low, Salt Creek, Byrd, John Jay, Frost and Rupley. In our own backyard are South, Plainfield and North elementary schools in Des Plaines, Dan Pietrini Elementary in Franklin Park, and Emiliano Zapata and Burroughs elementary schools in Chicago. At these schools low-income ranges from 60-97%, English learners from 37-58% and an ethnic background similar to 59's ranging from 40-100%. Their performance scores range from 40-59% and D59's scores range from 13-20% for the schools I mentioned.

Ask yourself, with the great teachers and excellent resources, why are D59 students not doing better than the students in these schools? Could it be the lack of a standardized curriculum, the amount of time D59 devotes to teaching the core subjects of math, science, and social studies which is less time than the state's standard, and the lack of a more structured homework policy that encourages self-directed learning by the students.

To the Juliette Low parents who have spoken at these board meetings praising the district and boasting about their children. Are your children being challenged? According to PARCC, only 20% of the "neighborhood" students have met or exceeded performance expectations. Is your child one of the 28 students out of the 138 "neighborhood" students who met or exceeded expectations? What could your child achieve if the district's academic standards were more rigorous?

At an August 28th board meeting during a discussion of the release of the raw PARCC scores, I recall Dr. Fessler mentioning it would be troubling if we don't see growth. We should all be very troubled, as our PARCC scores have been declining every year since 2015.
