

Year Pay Bus Fee

Each year the board approves the pay bus fee for the coming year. This is the amount a family will pay to have their child transported if it is determined that the student is non-eligible for free transportation. The pay bus fee for 2022-23 is based on the weighted cost per pupil calculation set by the state and the estimated regular education transportation costs. The rate is currently being determined for the 2022-23 school year. Four students currently pay for these services for the 2021-22 school year.
